In July 2003, a group of scholars from North America and Europe met in Perugia, Italy to take part in The First International Conference of the Phenomenology of Childhood. Gathered together, inspired by the beauty of the Umbrian landscape and conversations about phenomenology and pedagogy, the discussion turned to Max van Manen's former journal *Phenomenology* + *Pedagogy* and the idea of reviving the journal was born. In agreement with Max van Manen, Norm Friesen (Canada), Carina Henriksson (Sweden), and Tone Saevi (Norway) formed an impromptu editorial board. The first task was to look into possible ways to restructure the journal to fit a wider range of disciplines but also to consider more practical matters such as format, distribution, and scholarly associations with a possible interest in phenomenology and practice.
